FIGHT FOR THIS LOVE: SCOTT PILGRIM VS. THE WORLD

Have you ever been confronted by your girlfriend's ex when you're in a new relationship with her? Well, how about SEVEN of them?

That's the unfortunate problem our hero has to face in Scott Pilgrim vs. The World.

Based on the popular comic book series, the film is directed by the fan-popular Edgar Wright (he of Spaced, Shaun of the Dead and Hot Fuzz fame), so hopefully he should be able to bring his quirky, homage-enduced vision to a popular, and still ongoing, comic book story. It boasts a cool ensemble cast that includes the likes of Michael Cera, Mary Elizabeth Winstead, Kieran Culkin, Chris Evans, Anna Kendrick, Alison Pill, Jason Schwartzman and Superman himself, Brandon Routh. What, no Simon Pegg or Nick

Frost in sight? Madness! So, what's up? Well, basically, the titular character of Scott Pilgrim (Cera), a base guitarist for garage band Sex Bob-omb, meets the girl of his dreams in Ramona Flowers (Winstead). However, there's only one small problem - her seven evil ex-boyfriends are now coming to kill him. Now, Scott must defeat exes that range from skateboarders to rockers to movie stars to even twins, and win Ramona's heart in the end. Will he succeed or fail in his quest? Well, we'll just have to find out when the film is released 27th August.

CRUISE IN SHINING ARMOUR: *Knight and Day*

Having worked together in Cameron Crowe's Vanilla Sky back in 2001, megastars Tom Cruise and Cameron Diaz are back for a whirlwind, exciting and at time hilarious action comedy. Knight and Day, based on a spec script that had been circulating Hollywood for years, is directed by an unlikely source - James Mangold, director of 3:10 to Yuma, Walk The Line and, erm, Kate and Leopold.

However, the film isn't just the Cruise 'n Cameron show: also popping up in supporting roles are Peter Sarsgaard (who starred alongside Carey Mulligan in An Education) Viola Davis (recently nominated for an Oscar for an 8-minute scene in Doubt) and Paul Dano (part of the ensemble in Little Miss Sunshine and taunted by Daniel Day-Lewis

in There Will Be Blood). Diaz plays June, a woman who bumps into Roy Miller (Cruise), a charming individual, at the airport. Unfortunately, he also happens to be a secret agent who goes on to kill everyone on board the same flight as her. After they survive the eventual plane crash, she is pulled into a world of car chases, dodging assassins and uncovering worldchanging secrets. On top of all that, the mystery of Miller remains - is he a good guy, or a bad guy, or just insane? If this doesn't get adrenalin running through you, you're a corpse. But if it does, you'll be glad to hear it'll be out on August 6th, so you won't have to wait that long at all.


And he's doing just that this month, with a last-minute re-release of the sci-fi action-adventure film on 3D and IMAX 3D screens.

The basic premise for getting these guys together? Well, they happened to be best buddies back in school and now they're reuniting for a Fourth of July weekend together after a funeral for


their basketball coach.

Who would have thought that a popular Fantasia segment starring Mickey Mouse would have inspired the next Disney/Jerry Bruckheimer blockbuster?

After the surprisingly-entertaining *Prince* of *Persia*, Disney reunites with *National Treasure* star and director Nicolas Cage and Jon Turteltaub to bring *The Sorcerer's Apprentice* to the big screen.



IT GOES PERFECTLY WITH PEPPER: SALT

It was originally meant for Tom Cruise to start a new spy franchise. But when he bailed. Angelina Jolie was cast and, a few rewrites later, Edwin A. Salt became Evelyn Salt (smooth) for the latest action-thriller, Salt. Directed by Phillip Noyce, the director behind such cult hits as Patriot Games and Clear and Present Danger (two Tom Clancy adaptations that also, like Salt, deal with CIA operatives), the film also stars Liev Schreiber (most recently seen in X-Men Origins: Wolverine) and Chiwetel Ejiofor (Children of

The film centers on relations between US and Russian intelligence (for those who don't do history, the Cold War was when the two nations rivaled against each other with nuclear weapons etc). CIA agent Evelyn Salt (Jolie, of couse) is accused of being a KGB sleeper agent (basically, a Russian spy) assigned to assassinate the US President and, naturally. goes on the run to clear her name. But is she really who she is accused to be? Intriguing, yes. Exciting? Maybe. All signs point to "yes", and judging from the trailers, posters etc, this could really be the coolest and wellthough-out film of the year. Plus, who WOULDN'T want to see Angelina Jolie in anything, anyway? Film opens on 20th August, so if you can't wait that long,

just deal with it.

SHE'S SO HOT: THE GIRL WHO PLAYED WITH FIRE

In April, the first of the three already-filmed adaptations of Stieg Larsson's acclaimed Millennium book series, The Girl With The Dragon Tattoo, was released to critical praise.

Now, the second book in the series, The Girl Who Played With Fire, gets the Hollywood (well, Swedish) treatment.

Noomi Rapace reprises her role as Lisbeth Salander, a brilliant hacker with a troubled past, as does Michael Nyqvist as journalist Mikael Blomkvist.

The film picks up where Dragon Tattoo left off, with Salander and Blomkvist investigating a sex-trafficking ring. However, Salander has been accused of committing three murders, causing her to go on the run while Blomkvist works to clear her name.

Early reviews have suggested that while The Girl Who Played With Fire doesn't exactly have the qualities that made Dragon Tattoo so brilliant, it's still an entertaining piece. So, theoretically, this is the Two Towers film of the trilogy. Which means the next and final adaptation, The Girl Who Kicked The Hornet's Nest (due out in November) will be the almighty Return of the King film of the saga. Either way, don't miss this next installment when it reaches British shores on August 27th.

a large-scale sci-fi film starring Leonardo DiCaprio about corporate espionage involved with extracting the dreams of their clients.


