MOVIE OF THE MONTH: KING'S SPEECH

As you may have already guessed, awards season is once again among us. Members of the Academy are, as you read this, rewatching some of the best films to come out this past year and vote on which film goes home on Oscar night with a gold statuette. But mark my words, one of the films they will surely not overlook will be The King's Speech, a major competitor and January's Movie of the Month.

The unlikely yet lovable trio of Colin Firth, Geoffrey Rush and Helena Bonham Carter star in the film, and are joined by a great ensemble of actors including Guy Pearce, Derek Jacobi, Michael Gambon, Claire Bloom and Timothy Spall. Directed by Tom Hooper (who first turned heads with his breathtaking TV miniseries John Adams), the film focuses on the reign of King George VI (Firth), the father of our current Queen. Unfortunately, George (or Bertie as he was known to his family) suffers from a severe stutter, which makes it impossible for him to give public speeches.

After many failed attempts to be cured by the best doctors and therapists around, Bertie's wife Elizabeth (better known as The Queen Mother, as played by Carter) pays a visit to Australian therapist Lionel Logue (Rush), who offers to take on the challenge of helping the then-Duke of York with his speech problem using his eccentric and controversial methods.

It's all easy sailing until Bertie's brother King Edward

VIII (Pearce) suddenly abdicates to marry a divorced woman and Bertie must become the new King George VI.

With the Second World War inevitable, the pressure mounts on both George and Lionel to work together to get around his stutter once and for all and deliver a speech that will win over the hearts of the British public who fear the War and give them hope. It may sound like typical Oscar fodder - a drama about real-life members of the royal family, overcoming of fears and physical defects - but believe me when I say this is not a film to miss, and you should - I've already seen the film, and it's rather good.

I managed to catch a screening of the film at the London Film Festival back in October, and I was wowed by what I saw. There was

stunning character development, witty humour that had most in the audience rolling in the aisles and, best of all, absolutely wonderful performances by the three main leads.

Carter delivers the sass and higher-authority as the Queen Mother, Rush charms and delights as Lionel Logue, but this is really Firth's show, and he pulls off a performance better even than A Single Man, making the audience emotional when his character is emotional and pulling off the most convincing on-screen stutter I've ever seen.

But don't take my word for it - see it on January 7th and judge for yourself whether this deserves to be in the Oscar race this year (even though The Social Network seems to be halfway there already).

FAREWELL TO ARMS: 127 HOURS

It appears that the Oscar race this year is filled with real-life stories - *The Social Network* covered the controversial founding of Facebook, and *The King's Speech* - well, see page 1 for more details.

But there's another real-life story that's more modern and even gruesome than those films - it's Danny Boyle's 127 Hours.

The permanently down-to-Earth director, fresh from his major success of *Slumdog Millionaire*, reunites with writer Simon Beaufoy, producer Christian Colson and composer A.R. Rahman to bring a new story to the silver screen.

James Franco takes centre stage for most of the film as Aron Ralston, an adrenaline-seeking, cocky and adventurous mountain climber who rather literally gets caught between a rock and a

hard place when an accident leaves him with a massive boulder resting on his arm. Unable to move, Aron is forced to spend - you guessed it - 127 hours (for those who don't know math, that's just over five days) in the same position until he decides to take drastic and gory measures in order to break free (I won't spoil it for you, but all I'm saying is the clue's in this article headline).

While it may sound far from the feel-good qualities of Slumdog Millionaire, it is being billed as a must-see in this already-packed awards season and mustn't be missed on January 7th.

Revolutionary Road showed that love and marriage, even when it's Jack and Rose from Titanic, can be a bummer.

Two years later, along comes Blue Valentine - a film that takes this theory one step further.

Like the 2008 Sam Mendes film, which had two strong performances from Leonardo DiCaprio and Kate Winslet, Blue Valentine's two leads - Ryan Gosling (Half Nelson) and Michelle Williams (Shutter Island) - are simply superb (if the critics are true to their word) in career-best performances that will knock every foundation of your emotional barrier down like a ton of bricks.

The film follows a couple, Dean and Cindy (Gosling and Williams), whose marriage is dangerously about to whither apart. So, they decide to get

the spark back into their failing marriage in the course of one night. Along the way, they are reminded of the romantic memories of their courtship and also the painful ones of life afterward. Billed as a honest and moving look at a relationship on the rocks, the powerhouse performances of the two leads are already garnering awards attention (so far, the Golden Globes, Critic's Choice and SAG have taken notes) but will they be enough to get the attention of Oscar? We'll see for ourselves upon release on January 14th.

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DIRTY DANCING: BLACK SWAN

Wrestlers. Frequent drug use. Mathematics. Whatever the hell *The Fountain* was about.

Director Darren Aronofsky has accomplished a lot in his tenyear directing career, but now he's turning to the world of ballet (yes, ballet!) in *Black*

Not to fear, he's not doing a rendition of Swan Lake with women looking beautiful and men prancing around in tights. Natalie Portman is at the centre of this film, billed as a "psychological thriller set in the world of ballet", and she is joined by a handful of talent, including the up-and-rising starlet Mila Kunis (Family Guy, Forgetting Sarah Marshall), French actor Vincent Cassel (Ocean's Twelve and Thirteen). long-working actress Barbara Hershey and Winona Ryder in a cameo role.

Black Swan follows the story of Nina (Portman), an aspiring ballerina obsessed with her dancing life that lives with her pushy mother (Hershey), who is in competition to win the coveted Black Swan role in a performance of Swan Lake. However, Nina has competition in the form of new dancer Lily (Kunis).

Now, for those who don't know Swan Lake, it requires a dancer that can play both the White Swan with innocence and grace, and the Black Swan which represents guile and sensuality. While Nina is spot-on as the White Swan, Lily is the personification of the Black Swan. But as the two rivals form an unusual and twisted friendship, Nina begins to get more in touch with her dark side with a recklessness that threatens to destroy her.

It's easy to see why Natalie Portman is the frontrunner for Best Actress this year, as she is said to be just magnificent. The film is out on **January 21st** and is definitely worth a look

THE EMERALD KNIGHT: THE GREEN HORNET

When Seth Rogen, the overweight but lovable comic from the likes of *Knocked Up*, *Superbad* and *Pineapple Express* was assigned to star in a new superhero movie, the movie world did a sudden double-take.

But one strict weight-loss routine later and it seems he's ready to become *The Green Hornet*.

Rogen, who also co-wrote the film with Superbad and Pineapple Express buddy Evan Goldberg, has also attracted a visionary director in the form of Michel Gondry, he of Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind fame.

The cast is even more impressive with Asian pop sensation Jay Chou starring as Rogen's sidekick, Tom Wilkinson as the father figure, Christoph Waltz (fresh off his Oscar win for Inglourious Basterds) as the main villain, Edward "John Connor in Terminator 2" Furlong, and even Cameron Diaz is along for the ride.

The film sees Britt Reid (Rogen), the heir to his father James Reid's (Wilkinson) media empire. Unfortunately, Britt is a hard-drinking, womanizing brat - hardly fitting for running such a job. When James is found dead, however, Britt decides to do something meaningful with his life: fight crime.

Teaming up with his father's inventive employee Kato (Chou), they decide to become criminals themselves in order to protect the city from the real criminals leading to Britt becoming the vigilante known as The Green Hornet.

With the help of Britt's new secretary Lenore Case (Diaz), they begin to hunt down Benjamin Chudnofsky (Waltz), the powerful gangster that controls the gritty underworld. Will the Green Hornet and Kato succeed in saving the day? You'll just have to find out on January 14th.

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A HAIR-RAISING STORY: *Tangled*


The amazing has just happened nearly 75 years since Snow White and the Seven Dwarves, Disney has made its milestone 50th animated feature film. And like their first 1937 feature. they've gone back to their fairy tale routes with Tangled, a brand new take on the Rapunzel story. Surely when you were younger. you were read the story of Rapunzel? Well, for those who never were (and are now in the custody of child services due to parental neglect), it tells the tale of a beautiful princess named Rapunzel who has extremely long hair, is captured by a enchantress and locked away in a tower, and is only rescued when a handsome prince climbs up the tower using her hair, they escape, they live happily ever after, etc.

Disney's take on it, while the basic set-up remains the same, the "prince" of the story is in fact a thief named Flynn (voiced by Zachary Levi from TV's Chuck and, erm, Alvin and the Chipmunks: The Squeakquel). The most wanted bandit in the

kingdom, Flynn decides to hide out in a tower in the middle of nowhere - unfortunately, that tower just happens to be occupied by the beautiful but feisty Rapunzel (voiced by Mandy Moore). Seeing this strange new person as her ticket out of the tower where she has been captive for 17 years, she strikes a deal with the thief and they go on a wild adventure complete with a super-cop horse, an overchameleon and a protective gang of tough thugs.

And, like any other fairy tale, the two unlikely companions realize they may be suited best for each other (like that WASN'T going to happen - this is Disney we're talking about!)

Anyway, early buzz say it's a great addition to Disney's film archive and should not be missed upon arrival on **January 28th.**

THE GREAT ESCAPE: THE NEXT THREE DAYS

After making such Oscarbaiting films like *Crash* and *In The Valley of Elah*, you wouldn't expect Oscarwinning writer-director Paul Haggis to next make a nonstop action flick.

Well, prepare to be surprised.

The Next Three Days is the title of Haggis' fourth film as director (his first, for trivia fans, was the little-seen USSR musical drama Red Hot).

Russell Crowe, possibly trying to apologize for *Robin Hood* last May (as well he should), takes lead role and is joined by Elizabeth Banks (*Zack and Miri Make A Porno*), Olivia Wilde (*Tron Legacy*) and Liam Neeson (*Schindler's List*) in a small yet interesting cast lineup. So, what happens? Well, the film (which is actually a

remake of French film Anything For Her) sees Lara Brennan (Banks), the wife of John (Crowe), being arrested for the murder of her boss after crucial evidence is found against her. Highly doubtful, John attempts to get her released over the next few years but his attempts are all but useless. When Lara becomes suicidal, he realizes that she won't survive in captivity for long and decides to do the impossible - break his wife out of prison.

What follows is a whole series of events that show John researching the perfect breakout. But when the day finally comes, will John be able to reunite with his wife or will they both die in the process?

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BREAKING NEWS: MORNING GLORY

Let's be honest - *Daybreak* is a bit of a fail at replacing *GMTV* in the morning. So it's with great but unintentional irony that it is the name of the morning show in the new film *Morning Glory*.

Like Anchorman, however, it should be viewed as a satire of the escapades behind the scenes of news programs. but unlike Anchorman, the satire is more subtle here. However, it's also picked up an impressive ensemble of film veterans and new upand-risers, including the likes of Rachel McAdams (Mean Girls), Harrison Ford (Indiana Jones), Diane Keaton (Annie Hall), Jeff Goldblum (Independence Day) and Patrick Wilson (Watchmen). Directed by Notting Hill director Roger Michell, the film follows the story of Becky (McAdams), a hardworking morning TV show

producer - until she's fired due to downsizing.
Desperate for a job, she is eventually given the challenge of producing a failing morning TV show called "Daybreak" (and the British irony kicks in).

However, the job comes with firing a sexist co-host, hiring legendary but egotistical reporter Mike Pomeroy (Ford) as his replacement, stop the two warring anchors, and above all improve ratings or face unemployment again.

Watch as she tries to hold on to both her dream job and her sanity with the hijinks that ensue in *Morning Glory* which is released on **January** 21st.



On the 3rd of the month, DreamWorks Animation released their new take on the superhero genre with Megamind; this year's District 9 turned out to be the best-made independent films of the year in the form of Monsters; and Secretariat tried to be another Blind Side but bellyflopped hard.

The 10th returned us to that magical world of Narnia with *The Chronicles of Narnia:* Voyage of the Dawn Treader; Sofia Coppola's Somewhere won over audiences with its feel-good charm; and Johnny Depp and Angelina Jolie made an unlikely couple in *The Tourist*.

GOLDEN GLOBE NOMINATIONS: KING'S SPEECH LEADS THE PACK


The 2010/2011 awards season is finally underway, so why not start off with the first big event of the season - the 68th Annual Golden Globe Awards.

The King's Speech (which you can read about on page 1) has the most nominations this year, with seven including Best Picture (Drama), Best Actor (Drama) for Colin Firth, Best Supporting Actor for Geoffrey Rush, Best Supporting Actress for Helena Bonham Carter, Best Director for Tom Hooper, Best Screenplay and Best Original Score.

Coming up close behind it is The Social Network and The Fighter, which got six nods each (both for Best Picture (Drama), Best Actor (Drama) (Jesse Eisenberg and Mark Wahlberg), Best Director (David Fincher and David O. Russell) and Best Supporting Actor (Andrew Garfield and Christian Bale); The Social Network also nabbed Best Screenplay and Best Original Score, and The Fighter got two additional Best Supporting Actress nods for Amy Adams and Melissa Leo.

The other competitors for Best Picture (Drama) are Black Swan and Inception, which got 4 each (Black Swan also got nominations for Best Director for Darren Aronofsky, and Natalie Portman and Mila Kunis for Best Actress (Drama) and **Best Supporting Actress** respectively; while Inception was nominated for Best Director for Christopher Nolan, Best Screenplay and Best Original Score). James Franco (127 Hours) and Ryan Gosling (Blue

Valentine) join Firth, Eisen-

berg and Wahlberg in the Best Actor (Drama) category, while Halle Berry (Frankie and Alice), Nicole Kidman (Rabbit Hole), Jennifer Lawrence (Winter's Bone) and Michelle Williams (Blue Valentine) go against Portman for Best Actress (Drama).

Meanwhile, there are more surprises in the Best Picture (Comedy/Musical) categories: Tim Burton's Alice In Wonderland, musical Burlesque, family dramady The Kids Are All Right, action film Red and thriller The Tourist are up for the main prize; Johnny Depp (Alice in Wonderland) will go against himself (for The Tourist), Paul Giamatti (Barney's Version), Jake Gyllenhaal (Love and Other Drugs) and Kevin Spacey (Casino Jack) for Best Actor (Comedy/ Musical); and Angelina Jolie (The Tourist) has competition from Annette Bening and Julianne Moore (*The Kids Are All Right*), Anne Hathaway (*Love and Other Drugs*) and my personal favourite nomination - Emma Stone (*Easv A*).

Michael Douglas (Wall Street: Money Never Sleeps) and Jeremy Renner (The Town) will compete with Bale, Garfield and Rush in Best Supporting Actor, and Jacki Weaver (Animal Kingdom) races for Best Supporting Actress with Adams, Carter, Leo and Kunis.

THE FIGHTER KNOCKS DOWN COMPETITION FOR SAG NOMS!

The Fighter, the new boxing biopic directed by David O. Russell, has tied with The King's Speech for most nominations for the Screen Actors Guild awards.

With four nominations apiece, the two films will battle it out in the Best Cast Ensemble (basically, the SAG equivalent of Best Picture), Best Supporting Actor (Christian Bale for *The Fighter*; Geoffrey Rush for *The King's Speech*) and Best Supporting Actress (Helena Bonham Carter for *The King's Speech*; Amy Adams and Melissa Leo for *The Fighter*).

Also in with a chance of winning the "Actor" for Best Ensemble are Black Swan, The Kids Are All Right and The Social Network.

Colin Firth is up for Best Leading Actor for *The King's Speech*, and he shall be joined by Jeff Bridges (*True Grit*), Robert Duvall (*Get* Low), Jesse Eisenberg (*The Social Network*) and James Franco (127 Hours).

Meanwhile, Best Actress is filled with the usual suspects - Annette Bening (The Kids Are All Right), Nicole Kidman (Rabbit Hole), Jennifer Lawrence (Winter's Bone) and Natalie Portman (Black Swan), with the unexpected addition of Hilary Swank in Conviction

Everything else seems to be the same for the Supporting categories, except for another unexpected nod for John Hawkes for *Winter's Bone* in the Best Supporting Actor category.

BLACK SWAN RECEIVES 12 BFCA NOMINATIONS

Darren Aronofsky's Black Swan has been awarded 12 Critics' Choice nominations - not only the most of any other film this year, but also the most nominated film in BFCA history! The psychological thriller (which you can read about on page 3) got nominations for - DEEP BREATH - Best Picture, Best Director, Best Actress (Natalie Portman), Best Supporting Actress (Mila Kunis), Best Original Screenplay, Best Art Direction, Best Cinematography, Best Costume Design, Best Film Editing, Bset Makeup, Best Original Score and Best Sound. Trailing not far behind it are The King's Speech and the Coen Brothers' True Grit, with 11 nominations each, while The Social Network and 127 Hours gained 9 nods and 8 nods respectively.

The acting categories remain similar to those we've seen so far this awards season (Colin Firth, Natalie Portman, Jesse

Eisenberg etc) but they do include nods for new and/or upand-coming actors such as Jennifer Lawrence in Winter's Bone, Hailee Steinfeld for True Grit and Noomi Rapace for The Girl With The Dragon Tattoo (which is currently being adapted in English by another BFCA nominee David Fincher). The Critic's Choice Awards also features a category for the younger stars of 2010, including Elle Fanning (nominated for Somewhere), Jennifer Lawrence (Winter's Bone), Chloe Moretz (Kick-Ass and Let Me In), Kodi Smit-McPhee (Let Me In) and Hailee Steinfeld (True Grit). While the Critic's Choice Awards don't happen until January 14th, you can have a look at the whole list of nominees on page 11.
