MOVIE OF THE MONTH: THE

MUPPETS

- It's time to start the music, it's time to light the lights, it's time for us to be reacquainted with the Muppets in their newest feature film.
- 4 Simply entitled The
- Muppets, February's Movie of the Month is more or less a genuine celebration of the legacy that Kermit the Frog and gang had left on the previous generation and will hopefully continue to

will hopefully continue to leave with this one.

It also comes over ten years after their last theatrical outing, the financially-unsuccessful *Muppets from Space*, so it seems that in a post-9/11 world we all need a bit of Muppet silliness to remind us of the good things in life.

A determined creative team is also in place to make sure that this film delivers, including director James Bobin (Flight of the Conchords), writing team Jason Segal and Nicholas Stoller (Forgetting Sarah Marshall) and songwriter Bret McKenzie (better known as one-half of Flight of the Conchords). Segal also stars in the film, along with Amy Adams (Enchanted), Chris Cooper (American Beauty) and Rashida Jones (The Social



Network).

However, it wouldn't be a Muppet movie if there weren't a few celebrity cameos, so in the mix here are Jack Black (School of Rock), Emily Blunt (The Devil Wears Prada), Alan Arkin (Little Miss Sunshine), Zach Galifianakis (The Hangover), Neil Patrick Harris (Harold and Kumar), Selena Gomez (Monte Carlo), Whoopi Goldberg (Ghost), Ken Jeong (The Hangover), John Krasinski (The Office), Jim Parsons (The Big Bang Theory) and Sarah Silverman (School of Rock).

But overall, this is a Muppet movie, meaning that the likes of Kermit the Frog, Miss Piggy, Fozzie Bear, Gonzo, Animal etc are the real stars, not the human actors.

But it doesn't mean that humans can't be crucial to the plot either: a man named Gary (Segal) and his girlfriend Mary (Adams) accompany Gary's brother, hardcore Muppet fan Walter (a brand-new Muppet), to Hollywood to visit the famed Muppet Studio. However, they learn of a plot by evil oil magnate Tex Richman (Cooper) to buy the studio and drill underneath it to find oil. It's now up to the three heroes to reunite the long-separated Muppets and encourage them to do what they do best: put on a show. Experience the fun and brilliance of The Muppets from February 10th.

SCARY MOVIE: THE WOMAN IN BLACK

Now that Daniel Radcliffe has finished his ten-year stint as The Boy Who Lived, we were all wondering whatever he would do next. So, it may come as a bit of a shock or none at all to learn that he's taking on a supernatural horror film as his next big project.

But Radcliffe seems to have chosen a rather brilliant film to work on, a brand-new version of classic ghost story The Woman In Black.

The story was originally written by Susan Hill in 1983, but perhaps the best known version of the story is through its long-running stage adaptation in the West End (check it out, at the Fortune Theatre in Covent Garden - it's worth a visit!). How the story will pan out on film, put together by director James Watkins (Eden Lake) and writer Jane Goldman (Kick-Ass), remains to be



seen but if the trailers are anything to go by it should be a spooky treat.

This is Radcliffe's gig, but supporting him are actors Ciaran Hinds (Road to Perdition), Janet McTeer (Albert Nobbs), Liz White (Life on Mars) and Roger Allam (Tamara Drewe). Keeping with the original story, the film sees a young lawyer named Arthur Kipps

(Radcliffe) travelling to a remote village to settle the legal affairs of a recentlydeceased client. Kipps soon discovers that a mysterious figure is terrorizing the locals, and dives deeper into the mystery to uncover the horrifying secrets of the titular Woman in Black. Said film is released in cinemas from February 10th - don't get too scared!

Let's admit it - the 2007 adaptation of comic-book anti-hero Ghost Rider wasn't all that great, with hammy acting and lackluster action. But if society has taught us anything, we should be willing to give second chances (hence why Wrath of the Titans appeared in December's list of anticipated films of 2012), so with that in mind here comes the sequel/reboot/ whatever, entitled Ghost Rider: Spirit of Vengeance. Although it shouldn't really be classified as a sequel, actor Nicolas Cage (The Rock) is back in the role of Johnny Blaze and his demonic alter-ego of the title, and that is where the connections with the 2007

Neveldine and Brian Taylor (professionally known as Neveldine/Taylor, the guys responsible for Crank) - to the rest of the cast - Ciaran Hinds (The Woman in Black), who replaces Peter Fonda as the Devil, Johnny Whitworth (3:10 to Yuma), Violante Placido (The American), Idris Elba (Thor) and Christopher Lambert (Highlander). The plot of this film sees

Johnny Blaze (Cage) living in

self-imposed exile in Eastern Europe, believing that his powers as the Ghost Rider are a curse. But when he is approached by a monastic order and assigned to protect a mother and child from the Devil (Hinds), the Ghost Rider takes the case. Let's hope that this Ghost Rider improves on its 2007 counterpart, but we'll find out on February 17th.

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ALL GROWN UP: Young ADULT

There's always one person at school who's an absolutely horrible person to begin with, but they've completely matured by the time they reach adulthood.

Charlize Theron's character in *Young Adult* is not one of those people.

Instead, the latest character from the minds of director Jason Reitman (*Up In The Air*) and writer Diablo Cody (*Juno*) is a horrible person all the way through to the corenarcissistic, manipulative, selfish, you'd have to look through a thesaurus to find additional words to describe this woman.

Young Adult can therefore be seen as not just another comedy about unlikable people (see: Funny People, Mean Girls), but a thorough character anatomy of, to put it bluntly, a bitch.

Theron carries the movie with her Golden Globe-



nominated performance, and also there to provide supporting roles are Patton Oswalt (*Ratatouille*), Patrick Wilson (*Hard Candy*), Elizabeth Reaser (*Twilight*) and J.K. Simmonds (*Spider-Man*).

Theron plays Mavis Gray, a writer of teen literature who returns to her small hometown to relive the glory days and attempt to reunite with her high school sweetheart, Buddy Slade (Wilson). Trouble is, he's happily married with a child on the way, causing a chain reaction of dishonesty and deceit for this young adult (see what I did there? Oh, forget it...).

Young Adult is out on **February 3rd.**

CULT HIT: MARTHA MARCY MAY MARLENE

With all the higher-profile contenders for awards, from *The Artist* to *War Horse*, it's a shame that smaller films, such as *Martha Marcy May Marlene*, aren't getting as much of a lookin as serious contenders.

This film in particular, because it truly is one of the most effective gems of the year.

I managed to see this film at the London Film Festival back in October, and I came to this very conclusion about the film, directed by first-time director Sean Durkin - it's haunting, scary (but not in an obvious way) and damn well acted, particularly looking at the fearless lead performance of Elizabeth Olsen (in her debut leading role), who even in her first film proves that she's got more talent in her little finger than either of her older, more famous twin sisters.

Co-star John Hawkes (Oscarnominated last year for *Winter's Bone*) also shows up in a terrifyingly creepy role which he too plays to perfection.



Also in the film, with smaller but just as significant parts to play, are Sarah Paulson (New Year's Eve) and Hugh Dancy (Adam), who also do their best here.

The story sees a young woman named Martha (Olsen) flee an abusive cult, led by the charismatic but enigmatic Patrick (Hawkes). She calls her older sister Lucy (Paulson) and her husband Ted (Dancy), asking to come and pick her up, despite

the fact that she's been missing for two years. As Martha slowly begins to accustom herself once more to reality, and as we see the goings-on within the cult in horrendous flashbacks, her increasing paranoia leads her to believe that the cult are still watching her every move.

Martha Marcy May Marlene is definitely not one to miss - catch it in cinemas from February 3rd.

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
SEXY BEAST: A DANGEROUS JEREMY RENNER BOURNE LEGACY 08-03-12

METHOD Only a month after Michael

Fassbender released the raunchy sex drama Shame. he's at it again with the release of A Dangerous Method (except here, he keeps his kit on for the most part).

The film is the actor's first pairing with director David Cronenberg (The Fly), who with writer Christopher Hampton (Atonement) has adapted the play The Talking Cure which Hampton also wrote.

A Dangerous Method also marks the third consecutive and overall collaboration between Cronenberg and actor Viggo Mortensen who had previously starred in Cronenberg's A History of Violence and was nominated for an Oscar for the director's Eastern Promises. The other major players in the cast are Keira Knightley (Pirates of the Caribbean).



Vincent Cassel (Black Swan), Sarah Gadon (next seen in Cronenberg's Cosmopolis) and Andre Hennicke (Downfall).

The central plot focuses on the relationship between the two famous psychiatrists Carl Jung (Fassbender) and Sigmund Freud (Mortensen). Naturally, a woman comes between them - the beautiful but troubled Sabine (Knightley) - but their increasingly-tense relationship would pave the way for the introduction of psychoanalysis.

You'll understand why I keep referring to the kinkiness within the film when you see it from February 10th.



ACT YOUR AGE, NOT YOUR SHOE SIZE: CARNAGE

It's been a tough old time for director Roman Polanski recently. To give you a brief update, in 2009 he was nabbed by Swiss authorities and faced extradition to the United States for having unlawful sex with a minor back in the 1970s, but later the next year had that extradition enquiry denied and was declared a "free man" once

It comes as quite a sigh of relief to fans of the Oscar-winning director (for The Pianist) that he's now put all that behind him and proved it by making a brandnew comedy called Carnage. Based on the popular play God of Carnage by Yasmina Reza, the film can be best described as a black comedy satirizing the social-economic norms of expected adult behavior (I might have not worded this correctly, so if this is the case then apologies all round!).

The film's cast is very small, primarily due to there only being four characters in the whole piece. Nonetheless, they are




good cast selections - Jodie Foster (Silence of the Lambs), John C. Reilly (Chicago), Christoph Waltz (Inglourious Basterds) and Kate Winslet (Titanic) are all the major players

The film takes place in one apartment and spreads out across real time. Alan and Nancy (Waltz and Winslet) visit the home of Penelope and Michael (Foster and Reilly) to formally

discuss the violent incident that their children were involved in. But as the meeting progresses, increasingly childish behavior between the couples threatens to turn the once-cordial meeting into an evening of chaos.

A comedy for smart people, as it can be possibly called to the fullest extent, Carnage opens in cinemas from February 3rd.



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OSCAR BAIT: EXTREMELY LOUD AND INCREDIBLY CLOSE

It should have been the one to beat this awards season. It should have been a serious contender. But alas, the chances of Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close winning multiple Oscars have dimmed extraordinarily.

Not even with an Oscarnominated director (Stephen Daldry - The Reader, Billy Elliott) and Oscar-winning writer (Eric Roth - Forrest Gump) behind the scenes could save the film from having mixed reviews and somewhat disappointing approach to a serious recent topic.

Perhaps it's something to do with a member of the cast. Fortunately, there's nothing wrong with Tom Hanks (Cast Away), Sandra Bullock (The Blind Side), Max Von Sydow (Shutter Island), Viola Davis (The Help), John Goodman (The Artist) and Jeffrey Wright (Syriana). The one that does strike a bad nerve is the debuting 10-year-old actor Thomas Horn (who had previously appeared on an episode of the game show Jeopardy!), who if you watch the trailer seems to deliver - to



relate it to the title - a very extremely obnoxious and incredibly annoying performance in the film.

Shame of that, because the premise sounds promising - a young boy named Oskar (Horn) loses his father (Hanks) in the 9/11 attacks, and goes on a journey across New York City to find a lock-box that his father had left the key for.

But you be the judge to see how disappointingly bad it could very

well be when Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close opens on February 17th.

This Means War comes to cinemas on February 17th.





STILL SHOWING: WHAT HAPPENED IN JANUARY?

Hard to imagine that we're one month down in 2012 already. Luckily, there were just about enough films released in January to keep us from being bored, and here are just some of them. Things kicked off on the

6th January, which saw the releases of Seann William Scott's hockey bad boy comedy Goon; Meryl Streep's latest performance extravanganza as former Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher in The Iron Lady (brilliant performance, shame about the film...); and the likes of Annette Bening, Naomi Watts and Samuel L. Jackson starred in adoption drama Mother and

Child. Things started to heat up on the 13th, which saw invisible aliens invade Moscow in The Darkest Hour (an early contender for the worst movie of 2012, according to some critics); an ensemble cast including Kevin Spacey, Zachary Quinto, Paul Bettany, Jeremy Irons, Demi Moore and Stanley Tucci face an enormous economic crisis in Margin Call; Michael Fassbender exposed himself (in all senses of the word) in risqué sex addiction drama Shame; and Steven Spielberg delivered his take on the classic tale



of a boy and his horse amidst a World War 1 setting in War Horse. The films just kept on rolling in on the 20th, as we saw Ralph Fiennes direct and star in little-known Shakespeare play adaptation Coriolanus; Steven Soderbergh made us realize that we'll miss him as a director when he (eventually) retires in action-thriller Haywire; Leonardo DiCaprio attempted to fish for an Oscar as the troubled public figure J. Edgar Hoover in director Clint Eastwood's J. Edgar; Jonah Hill had to look after some bratty kids in The Sitter; Kate Beckinsale returned to the leather as sexy vampire Selene in sequel Underworld: Awakening; and Madonna had a go at directing the tale of the scandalous romance between King Edward VIII and Wallis Simpson

in W.E (although it was a story better portrayed in The King's Speech, and it wasn't even a main focus).

Finally, the first month of the year wrapped up with the releases of Alexander Payne's critically-acclaimed, George Clooney-starring Hawaiian drama The Descendants; Liam Neeson proved that he is still awesome even when fighting wolves in The Grey; and Clive Owen had to investigate a spooky disturbance in Intruders.


All in all, a good way to begin the year, and a good sign as to how the rest of the year may pan out! Film Feeder #20 Page 7





OSCAR NOMINATIONS: AND THE NOMINEES

ARE...



The time has come, ladies and gentlemen, for the Biggest Awards Show In The World, and the nominations have finally been announced.

It was Martin Scorsese's 3D family flick *Hugo* that came out the top contender with 11 nominations, followed closely by *The Artist*, which garnered 10.

Both films are up for Best Picture - which this year was structured so that somewhere between 5 and 10 films would be selected (this year, 9 films were nominated) - as well as The Descendants, The Help, Midnight in Paris, Moneyball, The Tree of Life, War Horse and perhaps the biggest surprise on the list, Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close.

In fact, many categories this year had their own surprises up their sleeves, especially with the actors. In Best Actor, joining George Clooney for The Descendants, Jean Dujardin for The Artist and Brad Pitt for Moneyball were first-time nominees Demian Bichir for A Better Life and the legendary Gary Oldman for Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy, while in Best Actress we have Glenn Close for Albert Nobbs, Viola Davis for The Help, Rooney Mara for The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo, Meryl Streep for The Iron Lady and Michelle Williams for My Week with Marilvn.

The supporting actor categories

also offered a few more shocks for Best Supporting Actor, Max von Sydow grabbed a nomination for Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close, joining Kenneth Branagh for My Week With Marilyn, Jonah Hill for Moneyball, Nick Nolte for Warrior and Christopher Plummer for Beginners; while the nominees for Best Supporting Actress went about as mostly predicted with nominations for Berenice Bejo for The Artist, Jessica Chastain and Octavia Spencer for The Help, Melissa McCarthy for Bridesmaids and Janet McTeer for Albert


However, it does mean that for the Oscar race, we have to bid a fond farewell to competing actors Albert Brooks (*Drive*), Michael Fassbender (*Shame*), Tilda Swinton (*We Need To Talk About Kevin*), Elizabeth Olsen (*Martha Marcy May Marlene*), Shailene Woodley (*The Descendants*) and many others who tried and failed - I salute all of you, for you may not be up for Oscars but you were still some of the year's best.

Those up for the Best Director Oscar are Michel Hazanavicius (*The Artist*), Alexander Payne (*The Descendants*), Martin Scorsese (*Hugo*), Woody Allen (*Midnight in Paris*) and Terrence Malick (*The Tree of Life*). Expect only three of them to actually show up (what with Allen being awards-phobic, and Malick being a recluse).

Films up for the Best Animated Film category feature American-made toons - Kung Fu Panda 2, Puss in Boots and Rango - and toons made elsewhere in the world - A Cat in Paris (no prizes for guessing where it was made) and Cuban jazz animation Chico and

Elsewhere in the field, fans hoping for a bit of last-minute love for the final film in the Harry Potter series, Deathly Hallows: Part 2, were left disappointed as it only managed 3 nominations in the technical categories including Best Art Direction, Best Makeup and Best Visual Effects.

All in all, congratulations to the nominees (all of whom you can see a list for on page 12) and it's official - the Oscar race has begun! Bring on **February 26th!**



BAFTA NOMINATIONS: THE ARTIST OVERTAKES SMILEY!

Even the Brits are digging *The Artist*, which has subsequently received 12 BAFTA nominations - just one nomination ahead of British hit *Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy.*

Both were nominated for Best Film, Best Director (for Michel Hazanavicius and Tomas Alfredson), Best Actor (for Jean Dujardin and Gary Oldman) and many other awards.

This editor is also very glad to see Drive - my favorite film of 2011, if you recall the December issue - up for 4 awards, including Best Film, Best Director (Nicolas Winding Refn), Best Supporting Actress (Carey Mulligan) and Best Editing.

Other films nominated for Best Film are Alexander Payne's comedy-drama *The Descendants* and US box office smash *The Help*.

Meanwhile, joining Dujardin and Oldman in the Best Actor race are George Clooney (The Descendants), Michael Fassbender (Shame) and Brad Pitt (Moneyball), while over in Best Actress we have Berenice Bejo (The Artist), Viola Davis (The Help), Meryl Streep (The Iron Lady), Tilda Swinton (We Need To Talk About Kevin) and Michelle Williams (My Week With Marilyn).

The awards also holds a category that the public can vote for - the finalists for this year's Orange Rising Star Award is a male-dominated group including *Thor* stars Chris




Hemsworth and Tom Hiddleston, Adam Deacon (*Kidulthood*), Chris O'Dowd (*Bridesmaids*) and Eddie Redmayne (*My Week With Marilyn*).

Special awards, including the Outstanding British Contribution to Cinema and the BAFTA Fellowship, will be awarded to John Hurt and Martin Scorsese.

GOLDEN GLOBE WINNERS: THE ARTIST STEALS THE SHOW!



Aside from winning Best Picture (Comedy/Musical), it won Best Actor (Comedy/Musical) for Jean Dujardin and Best Original Score.

However, the HFPA's high acknowledgement of the early era of cinema did not stop there, as Martin Scorsese was awarded Best Director for *Hugo*, which paid homage to the filmmaker Georges Melies.

Meanwhile, Alexander Payne's *The Descendants* won Best Picture (Drama) and Best Actor (Drama) for leading man George Clooney.

Other acting awards of the night were awarded to Meryl Streep, Michelle Williams, Christopher Plummer and Octavia Spencer who won accolades for their roles in *The Iron Lady, My Week with Marilyn, Beginners* and *The Help*, respectively.

Some more noteworthy winners of the night were The Adventures of Tintin (Best Animated Film), Midnight in Paris (Best Screenplay), the Iranian film A Separation (Best Foreign Language Film) and director Madonna's W.E (which saw the



singer win Best Original Song).

The Brits seemed to have more luck in the television categories, as can be seen by the success of *Downton Abbey*, which won Best TV Mini-Series; Kate Winslet, who nabbed her third Golden Globe for Best Actress in a TV Mini-Series for the title role in *Mildred Pierce*; and Idris Elba, who was awarded in the Best Actor in a TV Mini-Series category for *Luther*.

The TV series Homeland and Modern

Family won the Best TV Series categories (Drama and Comedy/ Musical, respectively), and other successful television actors were Claire Danes for Homeland, Kelsey Grammer for Boss, Laura Dern for Enlightened, Matt LeBlanc for Episodes, Jessica Lange for American Horror Story and Peter Dinklage for Game of Thrones.

BFCA WINNERS: THE ARTIST, THE HELP WIN BIG!

The big winners of the BFCA awards turned out to be The Artist and The Help, which won 4 and 3 awards respectively.


The Artist was awarded Best Picture, Best Director for Michel Hazanavicius, Best Original Score and Best Costume Design, while The Help was successful in getting Lead Actress and Supporting Actress awards for Viola Davis and Octavia Spencer, as well as Best Acting Ensemble.

Meanwhile, George Clooney was finally able to break the barriers after seven failed attempts to win Best Actor for his performance in The Descendants, and Christopher Plummer was awarded Best Supporting Actor for his part as a gay elderly father in Beginners. Other winners of the night included the screenplays for the original Midnight in Paris and the adapted Moneyball,



the films The Tree of Life and War Horse which both tied in the race for Best Cinematography, Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows: Part 2 won two awards out of its four nominations (including Best Sound and Make-Up), and Drive only won Best Action Movie out of its impressive

SAG WINNERS: THE HELP TRIUMPHS, DUJARDIN SURPRISES

With one of the best acting casts of recent years, it was little surprise that The Help emerged triumphant at the SAG Awards.

The film took home three

Ensemble Cast (the SAG equivalent to Best Picture). and the Best Leading Actress and Best Supporting Actress awards for cast members Viola Davis and Octavia Spencer, respectively. However, the real surprise of the evening was when the guild decided to give its Best Actor award not to current frontrunner George Clooney for his acclaimed role in The Descendants, but rather to Jean Dujardin for his turn as a silent movie star in The Artist, thereby making the overall Best Actor category thoroughly unpredictable for



Christopher Plummer was also a winner for Best Supporting Actor for Beginners, cementing his position to take home the big prize at the Oscars. Meanwhile, on the TV side of things, Boardwalk Empire took home two awards including Best Ensemble

Cast (TV Drama) and Best

Actor for Steve Buscemi. Other TV winners of the night included Kate Winslet for Mildred Pierce, Alec Baldwin for 30 Rock, Jessica Lange for American Horror Story and Betty White for Hot in Cleveland.

The Best Original Screenplay list is made up entirely of comedies, including 50/50, Bridesmaids, Midnight in Paris, Win Win and Young Adult.


Although the awards celebrate the best in screenwriting for the year,


