AMERICAN PIE: REUNION

It's been a good long while since we last saw the original poster boys for teen

- adolescence and sexual
- frustration.
- But now, nine years since they last graced the silver screen with a wedding to remember (and since then a good handful of forgettable DTV spin-offs), the East Great Falls High graduates are back for yet another helping of pie in May's Movie of the Month, American Pie: Reunion.

It was decided that a muchneeded trip down memory lane was in need for the series to get right back on track for the American Pie film series, and what better way to do that by organizing a high school reunion featuring all of your favourite characters?

The ones tasked with bringing everyone back together are writer-directors Jon Hurwitz and Hayden Schlossberg, the creators of the popular Harold and Kumar film series so you know that it's going to be a fun ride already.

But a reunion means the return of the original actors from the original series, so please welcome back Jason Biggs (Jersey Girl), Seann William Scott (The Dukes of Hazzard), Chris Klein (We Were Soldiers), Thomas Ian Nicholas (The Rules of Attraction), Eddie Kaye Thomas (Nick and Norah's Infinite Playlist), Chris Owen (The Mist) and John Cho (Harold and Kumar) as Jim. The time feels just right for a reunion with the right people. and if you grew up watching the adventures of the original American Pie group then this should definitely put your worst fears to rest. American Pie: Reunion comes out in British cinemas on May 4th (must... resist... Star Wars jokes).

BLACK TO THE FUTURE: MEN IN BLACK 3

Having been absent from the screen since Seven Pounds four years ago, Hollywood superstar Will Smith is back in perhaps his most famous role as Agent J in sci-fi-comedy sequel Men in Black 3.

Tommy Lee Jones (No Country

For Old Men) is also back as the straight man in the unlikely duo, who are part of the Men in Black, a top secret organization to prevent the existence of alien life from being known in public.

But this being a movie (the first in ten years since Men in Black 2), not all is as it seems. Director Barry Sonnenfeld is also back for his third film in the series, but there are a lot of new actors joining Jones and Smith for the first time, including Josh Brolin (Jones' co-star in No Country For Old Men). Emma Thompson (Nanny McPhee), Alice Eve (Starter For 10), Jermaine Clement (Flight of the Conchords), singer Nicole Scherzinger (of Pussycat Dolls



fame) and Bill Hader (*Paul*), with the likes of Adam West (*Batman*) and Lady Gaga said to be in cameo roles (who wouldn't be surprised if Gaga turned out to be an alien?) The plot takes place some time after the last film, with Agent J (Smith) travelling back in time to 1969 to stop an alien criminal named Boris (Clement) from assassinating Agent K (Jones) and changing the history of the world. Forced

to team up with a younger version of Agent K (Brolin), they set out to stop the alien as Agent J also faces the 24-hour time limit before risking being trapped in 1969 forever. Sounds intriguing stuff, but it will be a great pleasure to see Will Smith back on the big screen once again in *Men in Black 3*, out in cinemas on **May 25th.**

All together now: "Here come the Men in Black..."

FANGS FOR THE MEMORIES: DARK SHADOWS

Forget Brad and Angelina, don't think about the Beckhams, for the biggest powerhouse couple in the world is that of Johnny Depp and Tim Burton.

Having delighted the world over with such collaborations as Edward Scissorhands, Sweeney Todd, Alice in Wonderland etc, they're now back together to bring to the screen the supernatural soap opera known only as Dark Shadows.

With a stonking 1225 episodes to its name, the original series has become something of a camp cult classic - perfect material for Burton and Depp to adapt for their very own, as they have both claimed to have been massive fans of the original.

Of course, as you may have guessed already, Burton is directing and Depp is starring, but joining the latter on screen for the show are Eva Green (Casino Royale), Michelle Pfeiffer (The Fabulous Baker Boys, and also appeared in Burton's Batman Returns as Catwoman), Jonny Lee Miller (Trainspotting), Chloe Moretz (Hugo), Gulliver McGrath (soon to be seen in Spielberg's Lincoln),



Helena Bonham Carter (*The King*'s Speech and virtually every other Burton film), Jackie Earle Haley (*Watchmen*), Beth Heathcote (*In Time*), Christopher Lee (*Lord of the Rings*) and KISS frontman Alice Cooper.

Johnny Depp plays Barnabas Collins, who in the 1700s grows up to be a wealthy playboy and master of Collinwood Manor. However, he one day unwillingly breaks the heart of a witch named Angelique (Green), who turns him into a vampire and buries him alive. 200 years later, in 1972, Barnabas is freed from his coffin accidentally and returns to find Collinwood Manor in ruins, and occupied by his quirky, dysfunctional descendants who all have dark and terrifying secrets of their own.

Dark Shadows haunts cinemas from May 11th, and who knows? It may just be THE film that makes vampires cool again, and not by having them friggin' sparkle in the sunlight...



FREEDOM ISN'T FREE: THE DICTATOR

In October of last year, the ruthless Libyan dictator Colonel Gaddafi was killed by rebel forces after years of tyrannous rule and hardship. Such momentous times make it appropriate for Sacha Baron Cohen to bring out his latest comedy *The Dictator*.

The British comedian, perhaps most famous for his fictional alter-egos Ali G, Borat and Bruno as well as appearing in other films like *Hugo* and the *Madagascar* series, has created a brandnew fictional character for these modern times.

However, unlike the mockumentary style taken with *Borat* and *Bruno*, *The Dictator* is very much a scripted film with other actors taking part alongside Mr. Cohen.

Frequent collaborator Larry Charles (director of *Borat* and *Bruno*) directs, and said



actors include Anna Faris (Scary Movie), John C. Reilly (Step Brothers), Megan Fox (Transformers), Ben Kingsley (Hugo) and Bobby Lee (Pineapple Express).

Supposedly inspired by Saddam Hussein's book Zabibah and the King, the film centers itself around Admiral General Aladeen (Cohen), dictator of the fictional Republic of Wadiya and tells of the tale of how said dictator "risked his life to ensure that democracy would never come to the country he so lovingly oppressed".

To see what antics this new character from the mind of Sacha Baron Cohen gets up to, *The Dictator* comes out on **May 18th.**

THE DYING GAME: Now Is

She's been in showbiz for over ten years now, having worked with the likes of Tom Cruise, Denzel Washington and Sean Penn in the process.

But now, young actress Dakota Fanning makes her debut in British cinema with what has to be her most challenging role yet as a cancer sufferer in *Now Is* Good.

Fanning, who is also known to many Twi-hards (you have no idea how much I cringed at typing that) as sadistic vampire Jane, has adopted a flawless English accent for her character who goes on a heartbreaking journey of acceptance and, of course, love

The film is directed by OI Parker (*Imagine Me and You*), who most recently wrote the screenplay for Brit




hit The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel, and Fanning is joined in the cast by Jeremy Irvine (War Horse), Paddy Considine (Hot Fuzz), Kaya Scodelario (Wuthering Heights) and Olivia Williams (Wild Bill).

Based on the book *Before I Die* by Jenny Downham, *Now Is Good* tells the story of
Tessa Scott (Fanning), a

seventeen-year-old girl who is dying from leukemia. Abandoning treatments, she compiles a list of things to do before she dies such as lose her virginity, take drugs and fall in love - however, she doesn't expect the latter to happen with her next-door neighbor Adam (Irvine). Now is a good time to check it out from May 25th.

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KINGDOM COME: Moonrise Kingdom

Acclaimed visionary director Wes Anderson (*The Royal Tenenbaums, Rushmore*) makes his return to live-action filmmaking, after a brief foray into animation with the Oscarnominated *Fantastic Mr. Fox*, with the brand-new comedydrama *Moonrise Kingdom*. This film adds a little bit of nostalgia into the mix, setting it around the culture of the 1960s, while also managing to incorporate a cute theme of

But this is still very much a Wes Anderson movie, and if you've seen any of his work before (and you really should, they're subtle works of arts), then you'll know exactly what you're in for.

You also know it's a Wes Anderson movie because it has an outstanding cast ensemble lined up for this movie. The players for this movie include Bruce Willis (*Die* Hard), Edward Norton (Fight Club), Bill Murray (Lost in Translation), Frances



McDormand (Fargo), Tilda Swinton (We Need To Talk About Kevin), Jason Schwartzman (Scott Pilgrim vs. The World), Harvey Keitel (Reservoir Dogs), and debuting young actors Jared Gilman and Kara Hayward.

Set on an island of the New England coast in the glorious year of 1965, twelve-year-olds Sam and Suzy (Gilman and Hayward) fall in love and run away together into the wilderness. Meanwhile, a

search party led by a local sherrif (Willis), Sam's scoutmaster (Norton) and Suzy's parents (Murray and McDormand) is formed but as a violent storm brews offshore, the peaceful island community is turned upside down in more ways than one. Entrance to the *Moonrise Kingdom* will be granted from **May 25th.**

THE BIGGEST LOSER: JEFF, WHO LIVES AT HOME

The Duplass Brothers, who last graced our screens with the outrageous dark comedy *Cyrus* (and again, I must stress that it has bugger all to do with THAT Cyrus), return once again for the comedy-drama with both brotherly and motherly love entitled *Jeff, Who Lives At Home*.

However, Jay and Mark Duplass' fourth film as directors, writers and producers is more drama than comedy, giving them the chance to really flex their abilities to show dramatic muscle in their work.

The same can be said for the actors that they've lined up to take part in the movie, mainly Jason Segal (*The Muppets*), Ed Helms (*The Hangover*), Judy Greer (*The Descendants*) and Susan Sarandon (*Thelma and Louise*), the former three



being known mostly for their more comedic roles than dramatic ones. Hopefully, this film will give them all a chance to shine.

It may be so, as the plot sounds pretty inspirational: the Jeff of the title (Segal) is a 30 year old slacker who lives in his mother's (Sarandon) basement, meanwhile his better-off brother Pat (Helms) is struggling with a failed marriage. Fate puts them together when Jeff goes out on a simple errand for his mother, and the two brothers are united for a day to track Pat's possibly adulterous wife (Greer).

You'll want to get out of home to see this delightful film, out on **May 11th.**



JUST MY LUCK: THE LUCKY ONE

Even though it's the likes of Robert Pattinson and Taylor Lautner dominating the obsessive nature of teenage girls everywhere, ex-High School Musical star Zac Efron continues to make a name for himself as, unlike at least Lautner, an actual actor.

With some successes coming in the form of Charlie St. Cloud, Me and Orson Welles and the recent animated US smash hit Dr. Seuss' The Lorax (more on that in July's issue), he's looking to express himself in more ways than one in The Lucky One.

But if Efron himself isn't enough to get the squealing fangirls' bums on seats, perhaps this will: it's based on a book written by Nicholas Sparks, the same guy who wrote the source material for other lovey-dovey romances such as *Dear John* and, perhaps most notoriously, *The Notebook*. Mind you, that last one had Ryan Gosling in it, and since he was in *Drive* that



one gets a free pass.

Anyway, Efron is directed in *The Lucky One* by Scott Hicks (*Shine*), and also gets to share the screen with fellow actresses Taylor Schilling (soon to be seen in director Ben Affleck's *Argo*) and Blyhte Danner (*Meet The Parents*). Efron is Logan, a US Marine serving in Iraq on a tour of duty. One day, he finds a photograph of a woman

subsequently survives a surprise attack. When he is discharged, he travels to North Carolina to find her and takes up a job at her family-run local kennel. A budding romance eventually builds between the two (doesn't it always?), but certain complications soon arise.




show judge.




STILL SHOWING: WHAT HAPPENED IN APRIL?

Not even the rubbish weather could cast a cloud over the bright releases of April 2012 (drought? Bah!). Let's take a look at some of the biggest...

The month began with

a very Good Friday

indeed on the 6th, with the Oscar-nominated French animation A Cat in Paris: Henry Cavill teamed with Bruce Willis to find the former's family in The Cold Light of Day; the Norwegian thriller Headhunters became somewhat of a cult hit: Julia Roberts hammed it up in the first of 2012's Snow White adaptations Mirror Mirror; Sean Penn was a rockstar who went to search for his father's Nazi torturer in This Must Be The Place: and to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the sinking of the R.M.S Titanic came a 3D re-release of James Cameron's Titanic. It most certainly wasn't an unlucky Friday the 13th this time round. as the biggest release of that weekend had to be Peter Berg's attempt to capitalize on the success of the Transformers films with his version of the boardgame Battleship. And if that weren't enough, Joss Whedon collaborated with Cloverfield writer Drew Goddard to give us an original take on the



horror genre in The Cabin in the Woods: and Michael Sheen adapted his acclaimed Passion play to the big screen in Gospel of Us. The 20th soon came round with the releases of films like bizarre gothic-horror Elfie Hopkins, which united Winstones Ray and Jaime for the first time on-screen (on closer inspection of the last issue, I probably should have made a bad Winstones/Flintstones pun in the article headline but no use crying over spilt milk); Amanda Seyfried tried to find her kidnapped sister in Gone; Guy Pearce tried to rescue the President's daughter from a prison... in space (sorry, I can't get over how Bmovie-silly this premise is!) in Lockout; and Ewan McGregor's hapless scientist bonded with Emily

Blunt for their passion over the strange motive of bringing Salmon Fishing in the Yemen. Finally, the month closed out with one of the biggest films that this year has to offer the likes of Iron Man, Hulk, Captain America and Thor combined to defeat evil in The Avengers (yes, I'm STILL calling it that!). Meanwhile, other notas-big releases included cross-dressing drama Albert Nobbs; and racehorse drama Outside Bet (obviously not all the films released on that date. but since none of them could outshine The Avengers, what's the point of even listing them?).

Farewell April, with all of your crappy weather forecasts and Easter eggs. See you next year for even more of the same!



COMING SOON: WHAT'S HAPPENING IN JUNE?

Contrary to popular belief, the summer really starts in June as opposed to May or the end of April. But in film-terms, June marks the mid-point of the summer movie season, and for 2012 it has some very special films in store for us lucky people.

The 1st of the month is a Friday, and on this date we have some very exciting films out: Miley Cyrus makes the transition from Disney star to fully-fledged teen actress in LOL: Ridley Scott returns to the sci-fi genre that he helped to define with 1979's Alien, in the prequel/not-prequel to that film called Prometheus: and we get the second of 2012's Snow White adaptations, the coolerlooking Snow White and the Huntsman. The good times keep on coming at us on the 8th, as Simon Pegg attempts to conquer his paranoias in A Fantastic Fear of Everything; a chilling ghost story is to be told (and Daniel Radcliffe is nowhere to be seen) in The Innkeepers; and an entirely-African-American fighting force takes to the skies in the WW2 epic Red Tails. Next up on the 15th, writer-director-actor Noel Clarke brings out his next film, centred around two competing



female marathon runners (cleverly released just before some big sporting event in July...) called Fast Girls; and Tom Cruise may have climbed mountains and insanely tall buildings but now he faces his true challenge - singing as a rockstar - in the ensemble musicalcomedy Rock of Ages. The 22nd of the month fast approaches, with the big releases that weekend include Jason Segal and Emily Blunt's marriage plans being constantly delayed in the new comedy The Five-Year Engagement; paranormal things go down in starry psychological thriller (Sigourney Weaver, Cillian Murphy. Elizabeth Olsen and Robert De Niro all pop up) and Sundance hit Red Lights; and four couples try and turn the tables on their relationships in

surprise American box office hit *Think Like A Man*.

Finally, the month comes to a close on the 29th. The big ones out on this date are ensemble comedy (and unofficial Bridesmaids reunion - see the cast for further details) Friends With Kids; Queen Latifah leads a choir to stardom in musical Joyful Noise; and Noel Clarke - him again - stars in and cowrites a film about a group of people trapped in a government warehouse amidst an alien invasion in Storage 24. So, that's all there is for June 2012. It may not look like much at first. but it will do for now. Or at least until The Dark Knight Rises in July. Then they're screwed...


